Sensory modulation is the ability to regulate and respond appropriately to sensory input from our environment. For children with autism, difficulties with sensory modulation can lead to over-responsiveness (hypersensitivity) or under-responsiveness (hyposensitivity) to sensory experiences.

A child who is hypersensitive may find bright lights, loud noises, or certain textures overwhelming, leading to distress or avoidance behaviours. On the other hand, a child who is hyposensitive might seek out more intense sensory input, such as spinning, jumping, or touching objects frequently. Supporting sensory modulation involves creating an environment that meets a child's sensory needs. This might include:

- Providing quiet spaces for sensory breaks
- Using weighted blankets or fidget tools for calming input
- Encouraging movement breaks to support focus and regulation

Understanding each child's sensory profile helps us create a more comfortable and supportive learning environment. If you have any questions about sensory strategies for your child, feel free to reach out!

Gestalt Language Processors

There are 2 different ways in which children process and learn to use language. One of these is called **Gestalt language processing**, where children learn that a **sentence or chunk carries one meaning**. These children often use **scripted language or 'echolalia'** where they may repeat phrases/sentences said by others or from tv shows and movies.

Top tips to support an Gestalt language processor:

- Keep a diary/communication book with a list of the gestalts (i.e., phrases and sentences) your child uses. Look for patterns in which the gestalts are used and note down what they mean - e.g., a child may say "Peppa loves cake" to mean "I am hungry".
- Acknowledge all gestalts/echolalia. Repeat what they said, nod or smile.
- Use comments rather than asking direct questions. This allows you to model functional vocabulary/language that your child can use in daily activities.
- Get down to your child's level and follow their lead. Use activities that interest them. Watch, listen, join in and play alongside them.

Reporting pupil absence

Reporting

In line with our Attendance Policy, parents/carers must telephone the school (0203 8765076) or sent an email to admin@eagleparkschool.co.uk to inform us of the specific reason for their child's absence on each day of absence (unless the illness is prolonged, e.g. chicken pox). Symptoms must be provided;

advising that children are 'sick' or 'unwell' does not give enough information. In accordance with Government recommendations, a pupil suffering from diarrhoea and/or vomiting must remain off school for 48 hours before returning. For example, if they are sent home from school on a Tuesday after being sick, they can return on Friday, provided there are no further episodes of vomiting on Wednesday or Thursday.
