






Class News Dove Class





OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY



Play skills





Sensorimotor/Exploratory play

- Predominates primarily during infancy play
- Infants utilise there bodies to explore (thumb sucking, toe sucking); mastery of their own bodies
- Learn effect of their actions on objects and people in the environment (cause and effect)
- Combining objects & learning their meaning (pressing toys, reaching for them)
- **For example:** you can use musical toy instruments like rattles and drums to improve play skills.

SPEECH & LANGUAGE THERAPY

Supporting predictability (part 2)



New experiences can be daunting for your child. Help them know what to expect by talking through them in advance! Talk about:

Who will be there?
Where will it take place?
What does it look like?
When will it happen? When do we finish?
What do I need?
What will be expected of me?
What can I do if I need help/feel overwhelmed?

Use **objects and pictures** to support discussions.
